INTRODUCTION

Pursuant to 2 GAR, Div. 4, Chapter 12 §§ 12104-12105, the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse ("DMHSA") hereby submits its Agency Report answering all allegations set forth in the appeal filed by Latte Treatment Center, ("LTC"). All documents required under 2 GAR, Div. 4, Chapter 12, § 12105 are being submitted to the Office of the Public Auditor as part of the official procurement record and filed and served concurrently with this agency report.

ORIGINAL

DMHSA seeks a ruling by the Office of the Public Auditor that LTC has made an improper appeal, and thus moves the Public Auditor to dismiss LTC's appeal for lack of jurisdiction under 5 GCA 5425, after reviewing all the supporting documents. The matters complained of by LTC are not grounds for an appeal under Guam law. If the Public Auditor does not dismiss the appeal, we request that DMHSA be granted a hearing on the merits

The Office of the Public Auditor has ordered that the procurement record, the agency report and all other documents be filed and served on all parties by the purchasing agency on or before June 27, 2008. DMHSA has complied with this request.

RESPONSE TO STATED GROUNDS FOR APPEAL

- 1. LTC is completely unable to state why it should have been awarded the contract. To constitute a viable appeal, it should state why it would provide better services or do so more cheaply. It can do neither. The proposed award must violate Guam law in order to be set aside. 5 GCA 5452.
- 2. The party awarded the contract has represented that it can perform the contract more cheaply. In the judgment of DMHSA, it is also more qualified. LTC's costs have been questioned in the past (Ex. 2).
- 3. Dr. Luis Valdez, the main provider of services at LTC, is not a licensed psychologist on Guam. The Allied Health Board is currently reviewing his application for a license on Guam in light of his alleged history of practicing psychology without a license. Without a license, Dr. Valdes can not perform under the contract!
- 4. LTC's argument is mainly an attack on the ethics and credibility of DMHSA personnel rather than a statement of facts.

- 5. LTC has not properly documented its appeal. It has attached only its own descriptions of alleged irregularities in the procurement process without an adequate description thereof. Latte has submitted no proof of the irregularities or of violations of Guam law.
- 6. LTC, apparently thinking that it was entitled to a government contract in perpetuity, keeps confusing the renewal of its previous contract with this procurement. This is an entirely new contract that is being procured, albeit for the same services. Matters relating to the non-renewal of LTC's previous contract are outside the scope of a procurement appeal and irrelevant. This includes a "failure to terminate" argument made by LTC which is just ridiculous. Any failure to terminate LTC's contract benefited LTC since it continued to operate and be paid under the contract. (Ex. 10).
- 7. Complaints regarding non-renewal or non-payment are outside the OPA's jurisdiction. 5 GCA 5603. They relate to whether the government owes money to a vendor or other party. *Ibid*.
- 8. Appellant argues that DMHSA did not find that LTC did not meet the bid criteria. In this case, DMHSA found that another party was more qualified. That is not the same thing. LTC may meet the criteria and still be denied if there is a better contractor available.
- 9. A DMHSA employee did travel to a facility managed by the awardee several years ago, but on a matter completely unrelated to this contract (Ex. 8). There is nothing to suggest that favoritism played any part in the award or skewed the bid process. This is not a violation of the ethical Standards of Conduct enacted by Part B of Article 11 of Title 5 GCA.

10. DMHSA maligns Dr. Zackheim, an employee of the awardee, by bringing up criminal allegations that were unfounded and not prosecuted and which originated several years ago. This slanderous assertion shows how desperate appellant is.

11. The form of LTC's appeal is not "a concise, logically arranged, and direct statement of the grounds for Appeal". 2 GAR 12104(b)(3). It is more like an illogical rant. This violation is not merely a matter of form, for it makes it more difficult for us to respond and for OPA to rule.

<u>Deloitte & Touche</u>: Relating to the transactions with Latte Treatment Center (Ck #s 0072448, 0079088, and 0083852), similar to the above, we need a written determination of vendor selection. This determination must be dated before the contract formation and is a separate document from the contract. This document must specify the reasons for selecting Latte Treatment Center.

DMHSA Response:

In accordance 2GAR4.3112, please find attached a copy of the written determination and basis for vendor selection (DMHSA 05-05051, dated 20 May 2005). Below you will find additional information that led to determining the selection of this vendor. Furthermore, the Whereas provisions to the contract also provides the rationale for the vendor selection. DMHSA.

Excerpt for Contract with Latte Treatment Center, Inc.:

"WHEREAS, the procurement officer has provided adequate public announcement of the need for such service through a departmental Request for Proposal No. 2004-10 describing the type of services required and specifying the type of information and data required of each offeror and the relative importance of particular qualifications, in which no proposals were received; and

WHEREAS, the award of this contract has been made pursuant to findings by the Government that the Contractor is qualified based on the evaluation of services the Contractor is currently providing to children and adolescents that have been referred by the Superior Court of Guam for off-island treatment under the Government's Residential Treatment Fund Program; and

WHEREAS, the Government finds it necessary to procure the services fricthe Contractor through sole source procurement recognizing that the services needed by minor placed in off-island facility requires the same level of psychiatric care and a therapeutic environment that is mirrored to that which the minor is currently receiving for treatment on Guam to be effective; and"

While the contractual agreement cites sole source procurement, it also reference DMHSA's attempt to competitively procure these services through RFP No. 2004-10 that closed July 2, 2004; of which no proposals where submitted. It should be noted that DMHSA attempted to obtain other similar services through the RFP process, as demonstrated in RFP No. 2004-11 through 2004-15, which was announced on September 26, 2004. DMHSA experienced the same outcome, where no proposals were received from community providers, which clearly demonstrates the lack of readiness of the community to provide such services. This

major obstacle was clearly recognized by the grantor during its site visit in January 2005, where DMHSA was criticized for the lack of implementation of the mandated services.

In September 2004, the Superior Court of Guam issued a Stipulation Order that required DMHSA to procure a therapeutic group home to enable a consumer (A.M.O.) being treated off-island to transition on-island. It should be noted that Shiloh Residential Treatment Center was the current provider of services under the Government of Guam's Residential Treatment Fund Program. Shiloh subsequently locally incorporated on Guam to help facilitate the transition of A.M.O. to Guam. Therefore, Latte Treatment Center was the only capable and qualified provider to transition A.M.O. to continue the same treatment on Guam as provided for off-island. This was fully supported, as reflected in DMHSA presentations to the court. The consideration to outsource the aforementioned services to Latte Treatment Center commenced as early February 2006, as conveyed to the Superior Court of Guam.

In-line with the Cooperative Agreement for the CMHI Grant, Guam is in the process of achieving a significant milestone in establishing "community-based" services to serve children and adolescents with SED, particularly respite, day treatment and therapeutic group home services.

The Department of Mental Health & Substance Abuse is currently in the process of finalizing a contract with Latte Treatment Center (LTC), Inc., which is linked to the Shiloh Residential Treatment Facility located in Texas. Although Shiloh has been providing residential services for our children for years, it has incorporated on Guam, so that the same services can be provided locally in lieu of sending our children off-island. This major concern was expressed in Guam's application for the CMHI Grant, and, in the very near future, Guam will be able to "bring one of our own home". Just as important, this partnership with LTC will enable Guam to help build the local capacity in the three mandated services. The attachment highlights the services to be provided by LTC.

It should be noted that, although the mandated service of the therapeutic group home (TGH) was identified by the community as a low priority, the Superior Court of Guam established this array of service as a priority. In any case, since the opening of TGH, Guam has been able to place an adolescent in the home in lieu of sending him off-island.

With respect to the financing of the contract, the not-to-exceed price is \$805 K. The Department will fund this contract entirely from CMHI project funds: federal contributions and Guam's cash match to the Cooperative Agreement. Based on the Department's assessment, this approach is in-line with the requirements of the Grant.

Since your last visit, this endeavor is seen as a major accomplishment in the establishment of mandated services, and we are aggressively in the process of getting others services started, so that our consumers and families will have a wider array of choices for recovery.

LATTE TREATMENT CENTER

Latte Treatment Center, Inc. will be contracted to provide a continuum of mental health care for children/adolescents with severe emotional disturbances to include therapeutic group home, (24 hours a day 7 days a week) day treatment and respite care, clinical supervision, monitoring, and supportive services in a "surrogate family milieu" in a normalizing treatment environment, as well as other less restrictive treatment alternatives.

Consumers of the program will be assisted in acquiring and/or improving life management skills to include: behavioral management; personal management; nutritional management; educational management; home management; medical medication management; daily activity time management; social skills; vocational skills; resource utilization; problem solving; coping behaviors; and personal safety.

Highlights of Scope of Services

To provide comprehensive services that include therapeutic group home, day treatment and respite, within a continuum of care for children/adolescents with severe emotional disturbances. Services for consumers shall include, but not limited to, the following:

- milieu therapy; recreational therapy; case management services; mobility training; socialization skills; vocational skills; community living and independent living skills training; self-care and domestic skills training; positive behavior modification training; educational management; individual and family support counseling; medication management in the administering of medications; case management services to assist consumer on their needs assessment as identified on their Individualized Service Plans (ISP) / Wraparound Plans and updated periodically by the treatment team headed by the Service Provider's Case Worker and the Department.
- Development of an Individualized Services Plan / Wraparound Plans will be coordinated by the Department's Wrap-Coordinator and Social Worker, the family/representative of the resident, and the resident.
- Programmatic Services shall include assistance in achieving greater self-determination through the following supportive services: Personal Management; Nutritional Management; Money Management; Home Management; Medication Management; Educational Management; Behavioral Management; Daily Time Management; Problem Solving; Personal Safety Awareness; Participation in Community-based and home-based activities; Supportive Counseling.

In reference to our meeting on June 1, 2005 pertaining to the DMHSA memorandum to you, dated May 20, 2005, the following information is provided pertaining to DMHSA's decision on the implementation of mandated services for the CMHI Grant.

Foremost, with respect to the mandated service of therapeutic group home, it should be noted that, although the Shiloh Residential Treatment Facility is linked to the Latte Treatment Center (LTC) Incorporated, it was made clear in the contractual negotiations that day treatment, respite and therapeutic group home services to be delivered on Guam fully embraced the system of care principles and values. To ensure that these services are delivered and meet the expectations of DMHSA's approach to fulfill the requirements of the Cooperative Agreement, the number of admissions in a therapeutic group home setting will be defined by policies and procedures of DMHSA and the Contractor. The referral of individuals requesting utilization of the therapeutic group home program services shall be directed to the Department for assessment of appropriate placement. The Contractor and the Department will collaborate when managing the number of admissions to this program considering the needs of the child/adolescent, the current level of acuity, and any other presenting clinical conditions. The Department's policies and procedures will determine the next appropriate program available for referrals not accepted. In addition, it should be noted that the facility, where the therapeutic group home services will be delivered, is within the GFA's guidelines pertaining to the "use of funds".

Furthermore, the contract specifically states the philosophy of a System of Care, to include the Core Values and Guiding Principles, are applied within the operation and administration of the program, and are a part of the vision for community-based integrated services (i.e. child and family centered, strengths based, community based, culturally competent, access to a comprehensive array of services; individualized services using a wraparound approach; least restrictive environment; full family participation; integrated

services; care coordination; early identification and intervention; smooth transitions; rights of child protected; and non-discriminatory and culturally appropriate).

With respect to funding of the contract and under the Department's assumption that the services of LTC are in-line with the CMHI grant, the Department was able to earmark available funding within the budget category of contractual services. Therefore, in coordination with the Bureau of Budget Management and Research (BBMR), the Department concluded that the SAMHSA "Welcome Wagon" Notice for a re-budgeting request did not apply since it did not fit the definition of "significant re-budgeting"; however, BBMR advised the Department to inform the grantor of these actions, which was provided in the May 20, 2005 memorandum.

Based on the foregoing, the Department is confident that the negotiated contract and funding source are in-line with the provisions of the Cooperative Agreement, and appropriate mechanisms are in place to for the Department to be the gatekeeper for therapeutic group home services, as well as other services specified in the contract. The Government of Guam and LTC have finalized the contract, which will be executed by the end of June 2005, at which time DMHSA will handover the delivery of services to LTC.



Shiloh Treatment Center plans to bring its child and adolescent mental health treatment programming to the island of Guarn through Latte Treatment Center, Inc., an entity formed on the island for the sole purpose of providing comprehensive inputient, residential and day treatment services within a continuum of care to the local popular Locally incorporating Latte provides the advantages of a locally registered, owned a operated center that will most economically and effectively provide the intended sei that have traditionally been provided off-island.

A maximum of two managers from Shiloh are being reallocated to Guam in order to replicate the Shiloh treatment programs. These two persons will be training locally hired people to deliver direct care services as well as developing future Latte managers. The programs will use treatment methods sufficient to treat severe emotional disturbances as it has been doing for Guam citizens sent off island for many years. Modifications to the program involve integration of local customs and culture, and procedures fitting of the Guam facilities and area.







Thank you for the wonderful opportunity to meet and train with you and your staff. You have excellent people in your organization. I appreciate the hospitality and attention that I wi My message to the many people that have inquired about Guam has been most positive. live on one of God's wondrous creations (volcanoes, earthquakes and all)!

From the outset I have indicated my desire to help DMH build a successful program. At this stage in my professional life I am not interested in projects that are not going to last. After careful study and review of my trip to Guam I believe that a TGH is sustainable on the island but significant changes would need to be made. The task list and schedule presented to you all at the end of the visit, when completed, makes a TGH is viable for Guam. Experience with integrated programming and implementation is still a significant need.

It may or may not be possible to operate a TGH from within the department. As I mentioned most departments of mental health moved to a regulatory function many years ago and eliminated most or all "in-house" programs. Bureaucratic systems tend to tie up good personnel who could be providing services. I emphasize that the systems are the problem. The people are generally very good. As you mentioned "out-sourcing" and regulating services that establish the "object" from which to model from would be consistent with many modern operations.

I share Annie's concern about our current time line in light of the many details that remain to be completed before the return of AMO. Nonetheless, I offer the following two options.

Option 1

1. In order to open the TGH and have it fully functional and able to receive AMO within two months, a senior Shiloh staff person would work as a House Parent and Teacher's Aide on a 4 days on 4 days off basis beginning on the first day of operations.


2. Two staff persons would be assigned to this task. The two people would alternate shifts. Costs are approximately \$7000 per staff person per month plus expenses.

- 3. Luis Valdes, Ph.D. would continue as consultant and add the duties of behavioral specialist in order to plan, develop, and oversee the ongoing implementation issues that arise when an integrated individualized service plan is executed. Costs would continue at the current \$250 per hour rate. If a monthly rate is more suited to your department a salary could be negotiated.
- 4. Every 6 months a member of the Shiloh management team would spend a week on Guam reviewing program implementation. Costs would range from \$10,000 to \$16,000 per week depending on degree and level of experience.

5. Releasing two senior staff persons from their current full time duties at Shiloh and releasing management on a part time basis would require hiring and training addition a valuation and marked best property staff for its Texas operations.

Option 2

- 1. Shiloh is capable of managing and operating the CIU, TGH and Day Treatment components. There are numerous synergistic advantages to combining these three components.
- 2. The current TGH budget is capable of serving 5 children at \$500,000 per year. This equates with a daily rate of \$274 per day per child (\$500,000 / 365 / 5 = \$274 per day per child). This rate is average for the mainland US and would be considered a fair rate.
- 3. Mainland CIU daily rates are higher than TGH rates. Approximately \$300 to \$600 per day per child depending on the needs of the child. Shiloh can typically serve at this level for \$375 to \$400 per day.
- 4. Mainland Day Treatment rates vary widely depending on the level of service and needs of the clients. The rates are typically between \$90 and \$175 per day. Shiloh typically provides this service for \$120 to \$175 per day.
- 5. These rates can easily be compared to industry standards from private insurance companies, state governments and federal Medicaid reimbursement rates.
- 6. The current physical plant at Rays of Hope and the new TGH home are sufficient to run all three programs.
- 7. Most of the current staff would be retained by Shiloh, particularly upper level and experienced personnel.
- 8. If Shiloh operates these three components it would plan to turn the operations over to local control once services are firmly established. Current projections would be to turn over operation in 18-24 months.
- 9. It is possible that Shiloh could use its current structure to provide a level of quality that could reach JCAHO standards. If this were achieved on Guam, Shiloh could then use its current network presence in private insurance companies and TRICARE to attract other consumers to its CIU, TGH and Day Treatment services. Shiloh currently serves a wide range of clients including those with autism, mental retardation, serious emotional disturbance and juvenile delinquents. Shiloh has served many clients from beyond Texas' borders.



PETITION FOR WRIT OF MANDATE OR IN THE ALTERNATIVE FOR JUDICIAL REVIEW

Petitioner, Guam Legal Services Corporation, and Daniel S. Somerfleck, for their Petition for Writ of Mandate or In The Alternative for Judicial Review, states and alleges as follows:

- This Court has jurisdiction over this matter pursuant to 7 GCA §§ 3107(b), 31202,
 12104, 12105 and Section 82 of the Guam Code of Civil Procedure.
- 2. "The Child" has been determined to have a Serious Emotional Disturbance (S.E.D.) by his treating professional.
 - 3. The Child is a resident of Guam.
- 4. Petitioner brings this action alleging that Respondent J. Peter Roberto has failed, in his official capacity as Director of the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse (DMHSA), to provide necessary and statutorily guaranteed transition services and a transition home for the Child.

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FACTS IN SUPPORT OF PETITION

- DMHSA is an institution of the Territory of Guam. DMHSA was created by 10 5. G.C.A. §86103.
- 6. That pursuant to Public Law 17-21, as codified in 10 G.C.A. §86101 et. seq., DMHSA's declared public policy is to provide community-based outpatient mental health, alcohol and drug programs and services for the people of Guam, and to continually strive to improve, enhance, and promote the physical and mental well-being of the people of Guam who experience the life-disrupting effects of mental illness, alcoholism and drug abuse or who are at risk to suffer those effects and who need such assistance and; to provide such assistance in an efficient and effective manner in order to minimize community disruption and strengthen the quality of personal, family and community life.
- That pursuant to 10 G.C.A. §86102 (d) Mental Illness is defined as those diseases 7. and conditions the manifestations of which seem mostly to affect a person's behavior, feelings, thinking and perception and view of the world around him to the extent that his mental health is substantially impaired, including the mentally retarded.
- That pursuant to 10 G.C.A. §86105 (1)(b)(c) DMHSA's services shall include partial 8_ hospitalization and aftercare services to include transitional homes for the mentally ill; and inpatient services to include but not limited to acute psychiatric and alcohol and drug detoxification services. The department may contract in writing for the provision of inpatient services with any qualified providers. The department shall be responsible for insuring that the medical care standards and quality controls for inpatient services provided above are met.
 - 9. The Child is a resident of Guam.
- The child is a child with Serious Emotional Disturbance, who is entitled to the 10. services of DMHSA.
 - The Child's treating psychiatrist recommends placement in a therapeutic group home 11.

- Petitioner's treating psychiatrist has stated that the Child is ready for transition to a 12. Therapeutic Group Home setting and continued placement at the Children's Inpatient Unit will cause regression in the Child's condition.
- Pursuant to 10 GCA §86105, DMHSA "shall provide mental health, alcohol and 13. substance abuse treatment services ... Such services shall include: ... (b) partial hospitalization and aftercare services to include transitional homes for the mentally ill; (c) outpatient services to include as needed team services for children, the elderly and adults; (d) individual, group, and family counseling services;" (emphasis added).
- Pursuant to the above, DMHSA has a clear, present and ministerial duty to ensure that 14. a qualified individual is placed, where appropriate, in a transitional home with proper outpatient, counseling and other appropriate services.
- 15. The Child, through the Child's parent, has sought assistance and support in obtaining residential care from DMHSA, without success.
- The Child is in need of appropriate residential placement for children with S.E.D. to 16. transition the Child from the Child's inpatient placement to eventually returning home.
- DMHSA has created a program called "Therapeutic Group Home" or "TGH", which 17. is a program designed to provide the facilities and services that the petitioner needs.
- On information and belief, the TGH is open but not providing TGH services to any 18. child (See Attachment 1).
- Because the Child will regress if not moved immediately to a transition home, 19. irreparable injury will result to the Child is not provided proper placement and services immediately.
- 20. Because the respondent has a clear duty to provide the necessary services to the Child, and because the respondent has funds, a facility and staff they could provide a transition home and services to the Child by other means, little or no harm will result to the Respondent if he were

- On balance, all equities and considerations favor granting Guam Legal Services 23. Corporation an Alternative Writ of Mandate immediately.

DEMAND FOR RELIEF

WHEREFORE the Petitioner prays that:

- An Alternative Writ of Mandate issue ex parte under the seal of the Court 1_ commanding Respondent, its officers, members, agents and all other persons acting on its behalf to provide a transitional home and appropriate services to the Child, or that Respondent be ordered to show cause before this Court at a specified time and place why it has not done so or should not be required to do so.
- In the alternative, the Petitioner be granted judicial review and judgment in 2. accordance with Public Laws 20-220 and 24-16, and that the Court order Respondent to meet the requirements of these laws.
- The Petitioner be granted such other relief in law or in equity as may be proper and 3. justified whether or not prayed for herein.

I would like to set the record straight about Children Mental Health services on island and in particular to provide the Court answers to frequently asked questions about the status of the Therapeutic Group Home (TGH) and whether it is available and ready to serve children and youth in the community, and information about Rays of Hope (ROH).

First, the Therapeutic Group Home located on 306 Father Duenas Memorial Dr., Tarnuning, Guam is structurally ready and staffed to serve children and youth "enrolled" in Project I Famagu'on-ta, who due to their severe emotional conditions need out of home placement where they can receive the necessary mental health services for stabilization and personal growth with the plan to eventually return to their home or be placed in a more permanent setting. The home is also available for children and youth who are in off-island placements and are ready to return to Guam to be placed in the home as a step-down, transitional placement prior to returning to their families. Currently, the Department of Mental Health & Substance Abuse is working on outsourcing the service management of the home to a credible off-island private organization. Until such time that the service management is outsourced the home remains under the administration of the Child-Adolescent Services Division. TGH is a 24-hour, 7 day a week operation.

Secondly, if the "enrolled' child-youth is under the psychiatric care of a private psychiatrist, the psychiatrist can elect to request placement at the Therapeutic Group Home. The staff is willing, trained, and ready to provide the therapeutic support for the child and family. It has always been the stance of CASD to provide a wholesome, therapeutic and supportive environment for the child and family and that it is the treating psychiatrist that determines the appropriate placement for the child-youth.

Rays of Hope (ROH) is a Therapeutic Day Treatment and Respite Care Home. The services of ROH are again for "enrolled" children and youth of Project I Famagu'on-ta. ROH Day Treatment consists of an Educational Instruction component operated by the Special Education Division of the Department of Education (DOE). This service is from 8am – 12pm, Monday – Friday, according to

the scheduled school calendar year. The second component of the Day Treatment is the afternoon therapeutic component consisting of group enrichment activities, therapy, behavior management The Child-Adolescent Services Division (CASD) operates this part of Day Treatment. Respite Care is respite time anywhere from a few hours to three (3) days overnight stay. Accessing any of ROH and TGH services can be made through the child-youth Wrap Coordinator via the Departments referral form.

I hope this answers some of the questions frequently raised as well as clarifies any misinformation and misunderstanding. If I can be of further assistance, I can be reached at 647-5348.



§86101. Policy. It is hereby declared to be the public policy of the territory of Guam, to provide comprehensive inpatient and community-based outpatient mental health, alcohol and drug programs and services for the people of Guam, and to continually strive to improve, enhance, and promote the physical and mental well-being of the people of Guam who experience the life-disrupting effects of mental illness, alcoholism and drug abuse or are at risk to suffer those effects and who need such assistance and; to provide such assistance in an efficient and effective manner in order to minimize community disruption and strengthen the quality of personal, family and community life.

It shall be the public policy of the government of Guam to encourage the development of privately-funded community based programs for mental health, drug and alcohol abuse, in particular those programs that employ qualified local residents. As those services become developed and/or available in the Territory, the government of Guam may gradually phase out of such operations.

§86102. Definitions. For purposes of this Chapter, the following definitions shall apply unless otherwise specifically provided.

- (a) DEPARTMENT. Department means the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse.
- (b) DIRECTOR. Director means the administrative head of the Department.
- (c) COUNCIL. Council means the Council on Mental Health and Substance Abuse.

Substance Abuse Agency shall be transferred to the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse.

- (b) Upon the transfer of functions, all independent contractors and contract employees of the Mental Health and Substance Abuse Agency and the Community Health Center shall have the option of completing any existing contracts upon which they may be retained. No person who accepts a transfer to the Department shall, during the remainder of the term of his existing contract, which term shall in no event be extended:
 - (1) be removed from his employment except for cause; or
 - (2) have his salary or any of his benefits of government employment, if any, reduced except as such salary and benefits that may be reduced uniformly for all government employees.
- (c) Upon the transfer of functions, all classified employees of the Mental Health and Substance Abuse Agency and all classified employees except the nurses of the inpatient unit of the Community Mental Health Center of the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority shall be transferred to the Department in the same grade and step as they held at the time of transfer. They shall continue to be members of the classified service. The nurses of the inpatient unit of the Community Mental Health Center shall remain classified employees of the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority at the same grade and step.

§86105. Powers and Duties. A. (1) The Department, adhering to Federal regulations, local physical needs, feasibility and appropriateness, shall provide mental health, alcohol and drug abuse treatment services. The Department shall establish and adopt regulations concerning fees it may change for such services, which may be based on ability-to-pay standards as established by the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority's 'Limit of Liability' Program.

Such services shall include:

- (a) 24-hour crisis intervention services to include as needed a mobile crisis team and a hot-line;
- (b) partial hospitalization and aftercare services to include transitional homes for the mentally ill;
- (c) outpatient services to include as needed team services for children, the elderly and adults;
- (d) individual, group, and family counseling services;
- (e) inpatient services to include but not be limited to acute psychiatric and alcohol and drug detoxification services. The department may contract in writing for the provision of inpatient services with any qualified providers. The department shall be responsible for insuring that the medical care standards and quality controls for inpatient services provided above are met.
- (2) The Department shall provide mental health, alcohol and drug abuse prevention programs and services. Such programs and services shall include:
 - (a) affecting policy to change conditions to minimize the availability of drugs and other

Hotline Comments Alleging RFP Favoritism

I attempted to contact you via phone to discuss this matter but did not receive a return call.

This is to inform you and your staff of several Hotline tips our office has received alleging impropriety in the RFP for contractual services for residential home treatment. Among the allegations are:

- The arbitrary cancellation of one or more RFPs;
- A vendor did not meet all the qualifications such as licensure and may have been allowed to bid; and
- Certain DMHSA staff traveled to the stateside facility of one of the vendors with the travel paid by the vendor

In an interview on KUAM September 12, I noted that the government of Guam does have the right to cancel an RFP, but that the government should not be arbitrary or capricious in its cancellation of an RFP. The government should document the rational for the cancellation of an RFP so that a reasonable person would conclude the cancellation was for good cause.

Another comment I made was in reference to 4 G.C.A. §15201, which relates to gifts to government employees. A copy of the statute is attached. If, as alleged by the KUAM news staff, DMHSA staff traveled to the facility of a vendor at the vendor's expense or as guests of the vendor, that may be a violation of § 15201. Vendor-sponsored travel also may unduly bias staff in favor of the prospective vendor.

With respect to licensure, the RFP would determine the requirement. In OPA PA 07-002, we ruled that an off-island firm should not have been awarded a contract because the firm did not have a Guam business license upon submission of the RFP, as was a required by the RFP. Please note that an RFP may be drafted in such a way that a prospective vendor from off-island may submit a proposal or bid and obtain a required license prior to the award; a license does not necessarily have to be procured prior to the submission of the bid if the RFPOFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR

does not include such a provision. See 5 G.C.A. § 5008, a copy of which is attached.

A common audit finding is poor procurement history and lack of documentation in procurement, from specifications tailored to a particular vendor to favoritism in the selection of a particular vendor. Too many times the government of Guam is accused of not having a level playing field in procurement.

This memo is sent in the hope that you will do your utmost to ensure a fair, objective and impartial selection of the vendor. I would also urge that you seek the advice of the Attorney General in the review of your RFP and document thoroughly the process and selection of the vendor with the assistance of legal counsel.

If the selection of the vendor is not done in a fair and unbiased manner, the losing bidder may protest and appeal the selection to this office.

§ 15201, Gifts.

No employee shall solicit, accept, or receive, directly or indirectly, any gift valued singly or in the aggregate from a single source in excess of \$200, whether in the form of money, prize, service, loan, travel, entertainment, hospitality, thing or promise, or in any other form, when a reasonable person would infer that the gift is intended to influence the employee in the performance of that individual's official duties or is intended as a reward for any official action on that individual's part.

§ 15202. Reporting of Gifts.

- (a) Every employee shall file a gifts disclosure statement with the Guam Ethics Commission on June 30 of each year if all the following conditions are met:
 - (1) The employee, or spouse or dependent child of an employee, received directly or indirectly from any source any gift or gifts valued singly or in the aggregate from a single source in excess of \$200, whether the gift is in the form of money, services, goods, or in any other form;
 - (2) The source of the gift or gifts have interests that may be affected by the official action or lack of action by the employee; and
 - (3) The gift is not exempted by subsection (d) from reporting requirements under this section.

§ 5007. Policy Against Advance Payments.

With the exception of off-island orders of the Guam Public School System, no procurement shall be made under this Chapter which shall require advance payment.

SOURCE: GC § 6950.6. New Section. Amended by P.L. 17-45:5.

NOTE: This Section added by the Committee on General Governmental Operations. The Committee has observed the waste of money, loss of interest, and difficulty in recovery should something happen to the order when advance payments are made. Thus, there is a general prohibition on such advance payments.

COMMENT: Reference to Department of Education changed to Guam Public School System pursuant to P.L. 28-045:10 (June 6, 2005).

§ 5008. Policy In Favor of Local Procurement.

All procurement of supplies and services shall be made from among businesses licensed to do business on Guam and that maintain an office or other facility on Guam, whenever a business that is willing to be a contractor is:

- (a) a licensed bonafide manufacturing business that adds at least twenty-five percent of the value of an item, not to include administrative overhead, using workers who are U. S. Citizens or lawfully admitted permanent residents or nationals of the United States, or persons who are lawfully admitted to the United State to work, based on their former citizenship in the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands; or
- (b) a business that regularly carries an inventory for regular immediate sale of at least fifty percent (50%) of the items of supplies to be procured; or
- (c) a business that has a bonafide retail or wholesale business location that regularly carries an inventory on Guam of a value of at least one half of the value of the bid or One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) which ever is less, of supplies and items of a similar nature to those being sought; or
- (d) A service business actually in business, doing a substantial portion of its business on Guam, and hiring at least 95% U. S. Citizens, lawfully admitted permanent residents or nationals of the United States, or persons who are lawfully admitted to the United

States to work, based on their citizenship in any of the nations previously comprising the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands.

Procurement of supplies and services from off Guam may be made if no business for such supplies or services may be found on Guam or if the total cost F.O.B. job site, unloaded, of procurement from off island is no greater than eighty-five percent (85%) of the total cost F.O.B. job site, unloaded, of the same supplies or services when procured from a business licensed to do business on Guam that maintains an office or other facility on Guam and that is one of the above-designated businesses entitled to preference.

SOURCE: GC § 6950.7 added by P.L. 16-124 and repealed/recnacted by P.L. 19-4:12.

COMMENT: Originally added by Committee on General Government Operations. Follows a similar provision in Executive Order 65-12A, the former Procurement Regulations for the government of Guam. The aim is to encourage local businesses to the maximum extent possible. However, some needs of the government must be procured from off-island, especially services, and often such businesses do not have a system of agencies. Also, while local businesses are to be encouraged, they are not to be encouraged at a too-great expense to the general treasury. A safeguard is added to ensure that the comparison is equalized - so that what is compared is the total, delivered cost, not just the relative catalog costs between the on and off-island vendors. The formula "f.o.b. jobsite, unloaded" is taken from Hawaii law (HRS §103-43).

§ 5008.1. Policy in Favor of Native or Grown-in-Guam Horticultural Products.

- (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, in any procurement of horticultural products utilizing public funds, no less than seventy-five percent (75%) of the products to be procured shall be native to Guam or grown-in-Guam, except for horticultural products that are on the endangered specie list, unless they are domestically cultivated and shall be made from among businesses authorized to transact business in Guam. 'Horticultural products,' as used in this Section, includes:
 - (1) plants;
 - (2) trees;
 - (3) flowers;
 - (4) shrubs;
 - (5) grass; and

I am turning over all matters and correspondence related to this protest to Dr. Luis Valdes, President of Latte Treatment Center. Please complete all correspondence to him as my representative from this point forward.

Pursuant to Chapter 5 of the Guam Procurement Law and Chapter 3 Source Selection and Contract Formation I am officially protesting the procurement process for RFP/DMHSASA 014-08.

Latte Treatment Center is asking for a thorough investigation of the procurement process by an entity other than DMHSA. Latte has experienced numerous irregularities and many more have been reported.

- I am asking for copies of all documentation and data related to this RFP process pursuant
 to all applicable Guam laws, rules and regulations to be forwarded to the above address
 as soon as possible. This request includes documentation and data from all previous
 RFPs that have been part of this process.
- 2. Pursuant to the rules of protest there is much to be reviewed that cannot be reasonably ascertained within the 14 day limit on the initiation of this protest. Therefore, Latte reserves the right to submit further evidence and information as it comes available within 30 days from receipt of the above requested information.
- 3. Latte is requesting why the original multi-year contract (i.e. through 2009) was not renewed if funding was available for a new contract and contract negotiations were initiated on the Amendment to the contract.
- 4. Latte is requesting an explanation why the department is seeking to change vendors when there have been no citations for below standard performance of Latte.
- 5. Latte is requesting specific details as to why Latte was declined in each of the first 4 RFPs, as no explanation was provided by DMHSA, as required by Guam Procurement Law

- 6. Latte is requesting why multiple RFPs were issued until Zackheim finally won.
- 7. Latte is requesting why an RFP was re-issued, when Zackheim responded to the wrong RFP.
- 8. Latte is requesting an explanation of Zackheim's admission of paying for a trip of DMHSA staff.
- 9. Latte is requesting confirmation that the concerned DMHSA staff, who took a paid trip to Zackheim's facility, did *not* participate in any review panel for the responses to the RFPs.
- 10. Latte is requesting to know why RFP language was modified to specifically address the sexual assault/misconduct allegations of the other bidder.
- 11. Latte is requesting to know why RFP language was altered to increasingly exclude Latte, particularly on the basis of erroneous information regarding Dr. Valdes' license and service provision status.
- 12. Latte is requesting whether it is lawful practice to modify information in a subsequent RFP with information gained from previous RFPs, which would create an advantage of one bidder over the other, as was done in this case.
- 13. Latte is requesting to know why it repeatedly stated that there was no money to pay Latte, then continued to use the Latte services and then suddenly did have money to pay Latte when there was a court order to do so.

Further basis of the protest is:

- 1. DMHSA failed to respond to repeated requests for information throughout mis procurement process as required by procurement law.
- 2. DMHSA acted on and promulgated misinformation about Dr. Valdes without attempting to contact him. Information that Dr. Valdes received from the DMHSA Acting Director was knowingly erroneous. Dr. Valdes alerted DMHSA to the error but the inquisition was not stopped.
- 3. DMHSA repeatedly disqualified Latte Treatment Center without giving reason as required by procurement law.
- 4. DMHSA caused a restriction of trade for Latte by knowingly refusing to process invoices and making limited efforts to secure payment to Latte with full knowledge of the financial crisis it was creating for Latte.
- 5. DMHSA's nonpayment caused a restriction of trade by knowingly crippling Latte's ability to give a full response to repeated RFPs.

Latte Treatment Center RFP Protest

- 6. DMHSA knowingly and neglectfully did not complete the amendment to its contract with Latte with no indication as to why, yet, continuing to use the service, demanding full compliance with the contract and not paying for the service.
- 7. DMHSA created and promulgated the misinformation that Latte and DMHSA did not have a contractual agreement. This misinformation led to the issuance of the original RFP and its following revisions four months prior to the end of the contract year and with no indication as to why it was not exercising the renewal option on the contract. Yet, DMHSA continued to make referrals to Latte, demanded compliance with the terms of the contract and did not pay for the service.
- 8. DMHSA illegally courted the off island provider with the purpose of eliminating Latte Treatment Center. No complaint has ever been filed against Latte's provision of service. To the contrary, all related agencies can attest to Latte's quality of care (e.g., GPSS, CPS, Superior Court of Guam, DYA, Project I'Famaguota and the Governor in his re-election campaign).
- 9. DMHSA had determined the outcome of the RFP prior to its issuance. A Latte recruit went to work for DMHSA after being told by a DMHSA administrator that Latte would no longer be around. This occurred prior to the issuance of the most recent RFP.
- 10. Zackheim was given ımfair advantages which violates procurement law:
 - Zackheim indicated in an interview that he was working on his RFP. The timeframe he referenced was prior to the RFP being available.
 - Zackheim paid for the airline ticket for a key DMHSA employee to visit his program.
 - At one point both Latte and Zackheim were disqualified but no reasons were given as to why. It is believed that Latte was erroneously disqualified.
 - DMHSA personnel began announcing Zackheim's name during one of its failed attempts to shut Latte down.
 - The sequence of RFPs developed in such a way to increasingly exclude Latte and include Zackheim. Restrictions were added that were tailored to exclude Dr. Valdes.
 - Zachheim responded to the wrong RFP and Latte should have been awarded it at that time, instead DMHSA cancelled the RFP and continued the process until this last RFP was finally won by Zackheim.
 - The review committee ignored or was ignorant to Zackheim's lack of personnel in place for all items in the RFP.

Latte Treatment Center RFP Protest

Specific to Guam Law:

Possible Violations in Chapter 3 Source Selection and Contract Formation

- 1. Item (3)(D) on page 14 of Chapter 3 on Bid Samples and Descriptive Literature
 - -Zackheim may have included additional literature that the committee should not have considered during the selection process; this would have to be verified upon review of Zackheim's proposal.
- 2. Item (3) on page 16 of Chapter 3 on Public Availability
 - -On two different RFPs, notice was available in the local newspaper but not available for inspection. When a Latte representative went to DMHSA to pick up a copy, once we were told that they were not available and to come back that afternoon and once we were given an unsigned copy and had to return the next day to get another one.
- 3. Item g. on page 16 of Chapter 3 on Bidder's List
 - -Zackheim was notified by DMHSA when the RFPs were available; Latte was not. DMHSA was well aware of Latte's intentions to respond to the RFPs.
- 4. Item (4) on page 17 of Chapter 3 on Pre-bid Conferences
 - -Latte did not receive invitations to pre-bid conferences nor did it receive summaries of information shared at pre-bed conferences.
- 5. Item (2) page 19 of Chapter 3 on Opening and Recording
 - -DMHSA did not make available for inspection the RFP recordings.
- 6. Item (2) on Page 48 of Chapter 3 on No Disclosure of Information.
- -DMHSA disclosed information to Zackheim to improve his bid on subsequent RFPs. In particular when he responded to the wrong RFP and when he was disqualified.
 - 7. Item 3129 thruough 3131 on page 99 of Chapter 3 on Maintenance of records of the bidding process
 - -This has not been made available for any of the 5 RFPs in this procurement process.

Possible Violations of Chapter 5 Guam Procurement Law

1. Item 5008 Policy in Favor of Local Procurement

Latte Treatment Center RFP Protest

- -Latte Treatment Center is a locally incorporated entity with local employees a few off island consultants and one off island director. DMHSA originally requested that Latte building the local capacity by hiring and training local citizens. This was not considered in the biding process. Zackheim has no local employees, no local corporation and no local cultural experience.
- -The original contract allowed for renewal. The RFP process was not necessary.
- 2. Item 5225 page 37 of Chapter 5 on Cancellation of Bids and RFPs
 - -No reasons for cancellation were provided on any of the RFPs in this process regardless of repeated requests for such information.
- 3. Item 5485 page 70-71 of Chapter 5 on Complaints that Procurement Data was Withheld
 - -Latte made repeated requests for information on the RFPs but received none.
- 4. Item 5630 (d) on page 77-78 of Chapter 5 on Favors to the Territory
 - -Zackheim paid for one or more plane tickets for key personnel of DMHSA to visit his program.

Based on the foregoing and any other irregularities to be submitted at a later date, Latte is asking for full remedy of all 5 RFPs pursuant to Guam Procurement Law. In accordance with Guam's Procurement Regulations, I trust that a copy of this protest will be provided to the Attorney General within three days from receipt of this letter.



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Dear Senator Frank Blas,

I just heard your interview to a KUAM reporter on the KUAM Sunday, January 13, 2008 News, about the Request for Proposal (RFP) for the Therapeutic Group Home and Rays of Hope. You mentioned my involvement with the RFP and my visit to Zackheim group homes. Since information is already leaking out to the public even before the oversight hearing, I feel I need to respond to you.

First, I want to remind you that there are two sides to every "story". It is disappointing to know that despite the fact that you know me, you also know about I Famagu'on-ta as you had gone on a federally funded trip with I Famagu'on-ta staff, and know my role as the Administrator of Children Mental Health Services, you did not give me or I Famagu'on-ta the courtesy to find out from us the other side of the "story". As a matter of fact, the other side of the "story" which you did not seek to get before speaking to KUAM was factual information rather than unfair, sensational journalism.

Let me say that it is common practice, in fact it is encouraged among our System of Care Communities to visit sites and see what they are doing that are best practices in children's mental health services. Someone in our system of care field had visited Dr. Zackheim's group homes and had highly recommended that I make the visit. As we, at I Famagu'onta had been exploring ways to help our youth, many who are of transition age and have lots of needs in the area of transitioning to adulthood, which are services desperately lacking on island, I decided to take up the invitation to visit Dr. Zackheim's transitional group homes. This was about 2 years ago and we were not anticipating any RFP at that time. In fact, Dr. Valdes was already into a year of running the therapeutic group home and the day treatment services. By the way, this side trip was paid out of my personal funds. For your information, I had also visited Dr. Valdes' Shiloh group homes in Manvelle, Texas during one of my business travels at the request of the former DMHSA Director back in 2005, prior to Dr. Valdes getting the sole source contract in June of the same year.

Now, with regards to the RFP, I do not think that there were 5 RFP's. I believe there were only 3 RFP's written, and one RFP had a repeated announcement due to problems with dates, making it appear as if there were more than 3 RFP's written. In October, I was tasked by the Acting Director to do the final (4th RFP) because the previous ones were not written appropriately for what was needed, and being the administrator for children services, I knew best what was needed. The RFP that I wrote was thoroughly reviewed and edited not only by the Acting Director but also an Attorney from the Governor's office.

Back in Sept. 20, 2007, I wrote the then Acting Director asking to be recused from the panel of reviewers. I was excused from reviewing the previous 2 proposals, but I was told I had to be part of the panel of reviewers in the last one, as I had written the RFP and was the most knowledgeable staff member on children's mental health services.

Now, if anyone is to review the proposals submitted by the 2 offerers, it is not difficult to see the vast difference between the two proposals as far as providing the organized and very comprehensive information requested in the RFP. This, in my opinion, was the deciding factor as to who had the highest score, and thus the recommended selection.

I shall be glad to provide additional information if needed to set the record straight.

Hi Andrea,

I am providing you my input in response to several questions in Valdes' RFP protest. The following are the only ones that I feel I am able to offer a response to. I hope it helps.

#### #8 and #9 on p. 2:

I visited Valdes' Shiloh Group Home in Manvel, Tx. (exact date is Nov. 2004) About 6 months prior to his "sole source" contract with DMHSA for the Group Home and Rays of Hope. I have also visited other group homes such as the Brown School Residential Home in Tulsa, Oklahoma, where some of Guam youth have been placed. It is not uncommon for manager/administrators to visit sites to see what services are there and what services/interventions that work. My visit to Zackheim's group home was to see what services and best practices are available for youth with complex mental health needs and who are transitioning into adulthood. These are services that are greatly needed and lacking on Guam. This took place over a year ago, Sept. 2006. There was no RFP anticipated during that time and Valdes was a year into his contract with DMHSA.

I paid for the trip to Zackheim's group home. The government paid for my side trip to Valdes' Shiloh group homes during a business travel. The trip to Brown School in Ok. was a site trip during a System of Care conference in Oklahoma.

I had made a request (Sept. 20, 2007 e-mail) to recuse myself from sitting as a reviewer to allow other representatives from child-serving agencies to participate in the review and selection process. I did not participate in the first two review panels. DMHSA Administration required my participation in the last RFP review panel (Dec. 4, 2007). I have been to both Valdes' and Zackheim's group homes.

#11 and other questions relating to the differences in content/language between the first (Aug. 2007) and second/third RFP (Sept. 2007) from the 3rd RFP (Oct. 2007) are due mainly because of the following: The first 2 RFPs were written by DMHSA staff who were not very familiar with children mental health services as they work with adults. The last RFP was written by the Children Services Administrator who knows the services very well.

The revisions were influenced by the feedbacks and experiences from families, youth and children services staff such as Wrap Coordinators and other staff of I Famagu'on-ta as well as reviews and edits from the Acting Director and Attorney representative from the Governor's office. The language regarding sex offender is a requirement by the AG's office on all service providers.

Dear Mr. Perez and Dr. Valdes:

We are hereby responding to your letter of December 21, 2007. You request a thorough investigation of the procurement process by an entity other than DMHSA. You do not, however, suggest what that entity should be. There is a legal process for bid protests that will determine whether there have been irregularities. If you believe there has been criminal wrongdoing, please refer the matter to the appropriate authorities.

We will respond to your bullet points one by one.

- 1. The Procurement Law does not require us to provide this documentation. Since the matter is in a litigation posture, we believe it is better not to provide it.
- 2. We do not believe the law permits you to reserve rights at this point.
- 3. The question of renewal of an older contract is not part of a bid protest. DMHSA has already explained the decision not to renew, which is more than it is required to do. It believes that the new vendor will perform better. Latte did not meet the bid criteria.
- 4. See answer to No. 3.
- 5. See answers to No. 1 and No. 3.
- 6. See answers to No. 1 and No. 3.
- 7. See answers to No. 1 and No. 3.
- 8. Dr. Zackheim has been exonerated by a court and by the relevant licensing board regarding this allegation, which has no bearing on the bid.

- 11. Latte did not meet the criterion DMHSA determined were appropriate to making the award.
- 12. This is a question about the state of the law. Please consult your attorney.

- 13. Originally, there was no money available, but DMHSA eventually chose to use other money from its budget to fund the contract.
- 1. This point lacks details. Please provide the times, dates, means of enquiry and the identities of the persons asked for information.
- 2. This point has no bearing on a bid protest. If Dr. Valdes believes he was defamed, he may consult an attorney.
- 3. We disagree that no reason was given. Latte did not meet the bid criteria.
- 4. Your use of the phrase "restriction of trade" is unclear. Failure to process invoices, or any problem that occurred in the administration of a previous contract, is not grounds for a bid protest. As you know, the government is experiencing financial difficulty. Payments were made as promptly as possible.
- 5. See answer to No. 4.

- 8. Even if this allegation were true, it would not violate the procurement laws. It is not relevant to a bid protest.

#### Possible Violations of Chapter 5 Guam Procurement Law

1. The bid winner will, as required by Guam law, acquire a Guam business license. It will also employ local residents in its program, as would seem inevitable. Local experience was not one of the bid criteria. We believe that the "local preference" in the law relates mainly to construction contracts and agreements to purchase items and much less to contracts to provide professional services.

- 2. As stated above, the administration of a previous contract has no bearing on a bid process. DMHSA was free to renew or go through procurement as its choice.

Your letter alleges undue influence, defamation, favoritism and possible criminal activity. If you have the slightest evidence to support these allegations please provide it to us and to the appropriate authorities. If you do not, please cease from making unfounded, malicious allegations against government employees who bear you no ill will and do not deserve this treatment.

We are grateful to Latte for its years of service to the community. However, it is in everyone's best interest if Latte accepts this decision.

Please be advised that I am in receipt of Assistant Attorney General Highsmith's 15 May 2008 letter pertaining to my letter of protest on the subject RFP.

Foremost and regrettably, I must inform you that I take exception to the AAG's comments that my request for an explanation was "malicious", as I am only requesting an explanation as to why information in the RFP was changed to reflect specific information that was not included in prior, but related, RFPs. I do not understand and I take exception to the strong language "If you do not, please cease from making unfounded, malicious allegations against government employees who bear you no ill will and do not deserve this treatment". The Latte Treatment Center is only exercising its right to obtain clarification in accordance with Guam law. Further, I do not understand what he means by "litigation posture". I thought I was asking for a review.

As mentioned in the AAG's letter, please note that the Latte Treatment Center continues to follow 5 GCA pertaining to the bid protest process. To date, Latte continues to await a *prompt* Notice of Protest Decision from the DMHSA, as required by 5 GCA. Please provide written clarification if the AAG's response is being made on behalf of DMHSA. If the 15 May 2008 AAG letter is the formal Notice of Protest Decision from DMHSA, please be informed that Latte plans to file an appeal with the Office of the Public Auditor in accordance with 5 GCA.

For the record, Latte continues to exercise calm patience for everything the Latte Treatment Center has gone through under the current contract with DMHSA (e.g. non-payment for services rendered), to include the questionable RFP process, and is, therefore, seeking to ensure that fair and equitable treatment were exercised during the procurement process.

I look forward to mutual resolution of the subject matter.
