The Department of Parks and Recreation serves our island residents and visitors through the management of public parks and beaches, public recreational facilities and community programs, and through the protection and preservation of historical and cultural resources. These services are administered by the Parks, Recreation and Historic Resources Divisions of DPR. DPR manages and maintains approximately 53 public parks and beaches properties, manages Guam's only public cemetery; and is responsible for the protection of all historic areas, buildings and sites significant to Guam's history.

# Recent Accomplishments

- Installation of new electronic scoreboards to our baseball facilities.
- Installation of new Parking lot lights at the Hagatna Central Park (Pool & Tennis Facility).
- Improvements to Northern Sports Complex included construction of Press box, restroom and concession building to service the multi-purpose baseball fields.
- Renovation of the Salagula (Inalahan) Pool Park.
- Renovation of Aputguan (Alupang), Asan Memorial and Southern Mountain (Umatac) overlook Parks
- Renovation of the Governor Joseph Flores Beach Park (Ypao) and Matapang Beach Park Lifeguard Towers.
- Expanded operational service hours and days of operation for our restroom facilities island-wide.
- Expansion of the DPR's surveying efforts of historical properties island-wide.
- Paseo Baseball Stadium In-Field Re-skinning & Renovation.

## Renovation & Improvements

Limited Gaming Funds (local) and Department of Interior (federal) Funds allows DPR to continue with renovations and improvements to public parks and recreational facilities.

Plans include renovation of eight Gymnasiums and Recreation Facilities (Agat, Talofofo, Yona, Barrigada, Tamuning, Dededo and Guam Sports Complex and Pool and the Yigo gym.)

Future development of open green fields to enhance the demands of practice fields for multi recreational use (softball, baseball, soccer, rugby and football) to fill the needs of these growing sports event.



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## Increased Recreational & Community Based Programs

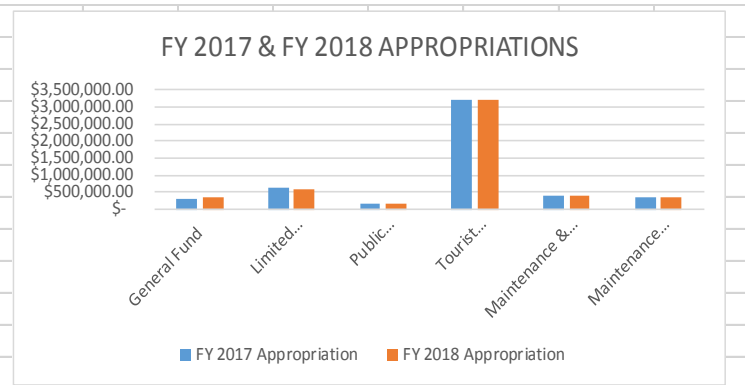
DPR continues to increase the amount of operated and public-private partnership sponsored recreational sporting events, health and wellness programs for our island residents and visitors.

**H**ISTORIC PRESERVATION ~ With the resurgence in development and the planned paced military buildup, the challenge and outlook for the future will be balancing the growth with our island's need to protect and preserve our historic resources. Safeguards are needed to ensure that the impacts of growth, development and land use do not negatively impact significant cultural and historical resources.
