In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the Guam Preservation Trust (the Trust) as of and for the year ended September 30, 2011, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States, and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, we considered its internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the effectiveness of the Trust's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Trust's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

During our audit, we noted the following deficiencies in internal control (as described above) and other matters:

Outstanding Encumbrances

The Trust has some outstanding encumbrances that are over one year. We recommend that the Trust revisit these outstanding encumbrances to ensure the projects are still active and in compliance with the terms of the grant agreement.

Classification of Expenses

We noted differences in the classification of expenses between operating expenses and project/grant costs recorded on the trial balance. We recommend that the Trust review the journal entries for expenses posted by their accounting service provider to ensure it is charged to the proper account. This will ensure accurate monthly reporting of expenses.
