Executive Summary Government of Guam

Submission of Procurement Training Compliance Reports for FY 2021 through FY 2023 Report No. 24-03, February 2024

Government of Guam (GovGuam) entities are mandated to submit a Procurement Training Compliance Report (PTCR) to the Office of Public Accountability (OPA) identifying individuals within their entities who have received training as part of the Procurement Training and Certification program.

Per Public Law (P.L.) 36-11, codified as 5 GCA § 5141(n), "every director, administrator, president or head of a government of Guam agency, including line agencies, autonomous and semi-autonomous agencies, public corporations, the Mayors Council of Guam, the Courts of the Judiciary of Guam, and" the Guam Legislature is mandated to "electronically submit to the Public Auditor of Guam, in an electronic portable document format, a 'Procurement Training Compliance Report," no later than thirty (30) days after the end of each fiscal year. At a minimum, the PTCR should contain the names of employees, their job titles, the procurement training module completed, and the date of completion.

As of December 31, 2023, we found the following pursuant to the mandates of 5 GCA § 5141(n):

- 27 of 77 entities (or 35%) submitted their Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 PTCRs. All 27 of the submitting entities submitted their FY 2023 PTCRs to the OPA before the statutory deadline.
- 26 of 77 entities (or 34%) submitted their FY 2022 PTCRs. Of the 26 entities, 21 submitted their PTCRs to the OPA prior to the statutory deadline, while the submissions of the remaining five (5) entities were untimely.
- 55 of 77 entities (or 71%) submitted their FY 2021 PTCRs. Of the 55, 45 entities submitted their PTCRs to the OPA prior to the statutory deadline, while the submissions of the remaining ten (10) entities were untimely.



Procurement Training Compliance

According to 5 GCA § 5141(b), "all government of Guam personnel tasked with the responsibility of purchasing or otherwise procuring goods, or services, or construction, including those employed by agencies with authority to conduct their own procurement, as well as any person within the [OPA] responsible for administering procurement appeals or auditing of the purchasing activities of the government of Guam, must receive the training and continuing education to the extent required under this Section [...]." The procurement training is administered by the Guam Community College (GCC), which is in possession of a database containing records of individuals who have successfully completed the training modules. However, GCC does not bear the sole responsibility of verifying program compliance according to 5 GCA § 5141(b). Their mandate is limited to the establishment and administration of the Procurement Training and Certification program.

OPA will also consider conducting a third procurement training compliance report in the near future to allow us to identify and inform GCC of GovGuam's updated procurement training module needs as there is still an increased demand for training and continuing education.

Conclusion

In OPA Report No. 20-09, we found there was no entity established or designated to monitor agency compliance with procurement training and recommended for the PTCR to be mandated as a form of monitoring agency compliance with the procurement training. Although the OPA sends out reminder memoranda, agencies' compliance with the PTCR has decreased from FY 2021 to FY 2023. We hope this first PTCR compliance report increases awareness for agencies to comply with the PTCR mandate and ultimately complying with the procurement training mandate.

Introduction

Government of Guam (GovGuam) entities are mandated to submit a Procurement Training Compliance Report (PTCR) to the Public Auditor summarizing procurement training compliance of all employees responsible for procurement within their respective agencies.

This report presents the results of our review of GovGuam entities' submission of PTCRs for Fiscal Year (FY) 2021, FY 2022, and FY 2023, pursuant to 5 GCA § 5141(n).

Our objective was to determine GovGuam entities' compliance with PTCR submission requirements as prescribed in 5 GCA § 5141(n). Specifically, we reviewed the entities' submissions of FY 2021, FY 2022, and FY 2023 PTCRs to the Public Auditor.

Refer to Appendices 1 and 2 for the objective, scope, methodology, and prior audit coverage.

Per 5 GCA § 5141(n), "every director, administrator, president or head of a government of Guam agency, including line agencies, autonomous and semi-autonomous agencies, public corporations, the Mayors Council of Guam, the Courts of the Judiciary of Guam, and" the Guam Legislature must "electronically submit to the Public Auditor of Guam, in an electronic portable document format, a 'Procurement Training Compliance Report,'" no later than thirty (30) days after the end of each fiscal year. The PTCR, at a minimum, must contain the names of the entity's employees, their job titles, the procurement training module completed and date of completion.

Background

The OPA recommended and created the PTCR to simplify the identification of all GovGuam "personnel tasked with the responsibility of purchasing or procuring goods, services, or construction, including those" personnel within the OPA "responsible for administering procurement appeals" and audits of GovGuam purchasing activities, receive the required training and continuing education. According to the legislative findings in P.L. 36-11, PTCRs from GovGuam entities were mandated as a response to the conclusion and recommendations made in OPA Report No. 20-09, stating, "There is no entity monitoring the government of Guam's agency compliance with procurement training."

The Office of Public Accountability (OPA) encourages all citizens to view entity PTCRs on the OPA website at www.opaguam.org.

Pursuant to 5 GCA § 5141(n)(2), the PTCR should describe the following content in an electronic portable format:



Results of Audit

As of December 31, 2023, we found the following pursuant to the legislative intent¹ of 5 GCA § 5141(n):

- 27 of 77 entities (or 35%) issued their FY 2023 PTCRs. All 27 of the submitting entities submitted their FY 2023 PTCRs to the OPA before the statutory deadline.
- 26 of 77 entities (or 34%) submitted their FY 2022 PTCRs. Of the 26 entities, 21 submitted their PTCRs to the OPA prior to the statutory deadline, while the submissions of the remaining five entities were untimely.
- 55 of 77 entities (or 71%) submitted their FY 2021 PTCRs. Of the 55 entities, 45 submitted their PTCRs to the OPA prior to the statutory deadline, while the submissions of the remaining ten entities were untimely.

For the purpose of this report, an entity's overall compliance with 5 GCA § 5141(n) were categorized per fiscal year into one of the following:



Decrease in PTCR Compliance since Implementation

OPA found that an average of 47% of entities submitted there PTCRs pursuant to the legislative intent of the law. Specifically, of the 77 entities that were required to submit PTCRs, 27 entities (or 35%) submitted their FY 2023 PTCRs. This is a 51% decrease from the 55 entities (or 71%) that issued their FY 2021 PTCRs.



Compliant Entities

From FY 2021 to FY 2023, fourteen (14) entities fully complied through the timely submission of their PTCRs to OPA. As a result, these entities have shown a commitment to provide readily available information regarding the identification of individuals accountable for the procurement of goods and services for their agency. Throughout FY 2021 to FY 2023, the most common cause for partial compliance was untimely submissions to OPA. Refer to Table 3 and Table 4 for partial compliance listings of agencies.

For FY 2023, 27 of 77 entities (or 35%) submitted a PTCR. All 27 entities fully complied by submitting their PTCRs to the OPA. There were no partially compliant submissions.

For FY 2022, 26 of 77 entities (or 34%) submitted a PTCR. Of the 26, 21 entities fully complied by submitting their PTCRs to the OPA. The remaining five of the 26 entities were determined to be partially compliant for submissions of their PTCR.

Non-Compliant Entities

Of the GovGuam entities required to submit PTCRs, 22 of 77 entities (or 29%) were non-compliant for FY 2021 for failure to submit a PTCR or any form of response to the OPA. In addition, 51 of 77 entities (or 66%) for FY 2022, and 50 of 77 entities (or 65%) for FY 2023 were identified to be non-compliant. A total of eighteen (18) GovGuam entities failed to submit a PTCR to the Public Auditor since the enactment of P.L. 36-11, which deemed those entities as non-compliant, overall. See Table 5 below.

PTCR Compliance

According to 5 GCA § 5141(b), "all government of Guam personnel tasked with the responsibility of purchasing or otherwise procuring goods, or services, or construction, including those employed by agencies with authority to conduct their own procurement, as well as any person within the [OPA] responsible for administering procurement appeals or auditing of the purchasing activities

of the government of Guam, must receive the training and continuing education to the extent required under this Section." The data that was collected from GCC for OPA Report 20-09 has shown that various entities have encountered employee turnover. Interestingly, many former employees of these entities who received procurement training of at least Module 1 or higher, have been hired by other entities. Additionally, it is important to mention that although GCC is in possession of a database containing records of individuals who have successfully completed the training modules, GCC does not bear the sole responsibility of verifying program compliance according to 5 GCA § 5141(b). Their mandate is limited to the establishment and administration of the Procurement Training and Certification program, prompting the OPA recommendation to mandate the PTCR as a way to monitor agency compliance.

OPA will consider conducting a third procurement training compliance report in the near future to allow us to identify and inform GCC of GovGuam's updated procurement training module needs as there is still an increased demand for training and continuing education.

Conclusion

As of December 31, 2023, our review determined the following, pursuant to the requirements of 5 GCA § 5141(n):

- 27 of 77 entities (or 35%) submitted their FY 2023 PTCRs. All 27 of the submitting entities submitted their FY 2023 PTCRs to the OPA before the statutory deadline.
- 26 of 77 entities (or 34%) submitted their FY 2022 PTCRs. Of the 26, 21 entities submitted their PTCRs to the OPA prior to the mandated deadline, while the submissions of the remaining five (5) entities were untimely.
- 55 of 77 entities (or 71%) submitted their FY 2021 PTCRs. Of the 55, 45 entities submitted their PTCRs to the OPA prior to the mandated deadline, while the submissions of the remaining ten (10) entities were untimely.

However, 50 of 77 (or 65%) were non-compliant for FY 2023, because they did not submit their PTCRs to the OPA nor did they have a late submission. Additionally, 51 of 77 (or 66%) for FY 2022, and 22 of 77 (or 29%) for FY 2021 were non-compliant during the scope period. Of these non-compliant entities, a total of eighteen (18) GovGuam entities failed to submit a PTCR to the Public Auditor since the enactment of P.L. 36-11, covering our scope period from FY 2021 to FY 2023.

In OPA Report No. 20-09, we found that no entity was established or designated to monitor agency compliance with procurement training and recommended for the PTCR to be mandated as a form of monitoring agency compliance with the procurement training. Although the OPA sends out reminder memoranda, agencies' compliance with the PTCR has decreased from FY 2021 to FY 2023. We hope this PTCR compliance report increases awareness for agencies to comply with the PTCR mandate, and ultimately complying with the procurement training mandate.

OPA will also consider conducting a third procurement training compliance report in the near future to allows us to identify and inform GCC of GovGuam's updated procurement training module needs as there is still an increased demand for training and continuing education.

Objective, Scope, and Methodology

Our objective was to determine GovGuam entities' compliance with PTCR submission requirements as prescribed in 5 GCA § 5141(n). Specifically, we reviewed the entities' submissions of FY 2021, FY 2022, and FY 2023 PTCRs to the Public Auditor

In this report, "entities" refers to GovGuam agencies, including line agencies, autonomous and semi-autonomous agencies, public corporations, the Mayors Council of Guam, the Courts of the Judiciary of Guam, and the Guam Legislature.

The scope of our report covered PTCRs required for FY 2021 through FY 2023, as of December 31, 2023.

To accomplish our objective, we completed the following:

- Reviewed memoranda sent to all GovGuam entities reminding them of the FY 2021 through FY 2023 PTCR submission deadlines, due 30 days after the end of the fiscal year.
 - o Memo dated September 30, 2021 for FY 2021 PTCRs which were due November 1, 2021.
 - Memo dated October 5, 2022 for FY 2022 PTCRs which were due November 1, 2022.
 - Memo dated October 2, 2023 for FY 2023 PTCRs which were due November 1, 2023.
- Reviewed PTCR laws, guidelines, prior audits, hotline tips, and other relevant information.
- Reviewed OPA administrative email account for electronic submissions of PTCRs.
- Verified with OPA staff if PTCRs were received, whether via e-mail or in print.
- Compiled a database of all agencies to determine compliance (and non-compliance)

Due to the nature of this report, we did not assess internal controls over the information systems used to gather the necessary data to prepare the entities' PTCRs.

We conducted this review in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards. These standards require that we plan and perform the review to obtain sufficient and appropriate evidence to provide a reasonable basis for our findings and conclusions based on our objectives. We believe that the evidence obtained provides a reasonable basis for our findings and conclusions based on our objectives.

Appendix 2:

Prior Audit Coverage

OPA Report No. 19-04

OPA conducted a review in April 2019 of the Guam Procurement Training and Certification Program, which revealed that GovGuam agencies had only partially complied with the requirements. The OPA recommended that all GovGuam executive and legislative personnel, and all government staff handling procurement, obtain certification of Module 1 and assess the need for further certifications in the remaining modules depending on procurement involvement.

OPA Report No. 20-09

OPA conducted a follow-up review in December 2020 of the GovGuam Procurement Training and Certification Program to determine GovGuam entities' compliance with the procurement training and certification requirements of Public Law 32-131. The OPA found there was no entity established or designated to monitor agency compliance with procurement training and recommended the law be amended to require all agencies to annually submit a summary report to the Public Auditor of procurement training compliance of all employees responsible for procurement.

Excerpts from Applicable Laws

P.L. 36-11 An Act to Add a New § 5141(n) of Subarticle E, Article 2, Chapter 5, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated; and Add a New § 1924 to Chapter 19, Title 1, Guam Code Annotated, Relative to Requiring Government of Guam Agencies to Submit a Procurement Training Compliance Report to The Office of Public Accountability.

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* finds that according to the conclusions and recommendations in the OPA Report No. 20-09, Government of Guam Procurement Training and Certification Follow-up Audit, there is no entity monitoring the government of Guam's agency compliance with the procurement training.

Therefore, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* intends to follow said OPA Report recommendations by having all agencies submit a procurement compliance report to the Office of Public Accountability.

5 GCA § 5141. Training and Certification of Purchasing Personnel and Vendors.

- (a) Guam Community College Procurement Program. The Guam Community College (GCC, College) *shall* establish and administer an integrated program of academic, research, practical training, and continuing education, and provide the same on a full cost recovery basis, for government of Guam procurement personnel and other interested private or public participants, to be known as the "GCC Procurement Program."
- (b) Mandatory Certification and Continuing Education. Notwithstanding any other provision of law or this Chapter and effective October 1, 2016, all government of Guam personnel tasked with the responsibility of purchasing or otherwise procuring goods, or services, or construction, including those employed by agencies with authority to conduct their own procurement, as well as any person within the Office of Public Accountability responsible for administering procurement appeals or auditing of the purchasing activities of the government of Guam, must receive the training and continuing education to the extent required under this Section and offered by the College in consultation with the Guam Procurement Advisory Council. A government of Guam employee who is required to receive the training may not participate in purchases by the employing agency *unless* the employee has received the required training or received equivalent training from a national association recognized by the College and the Guam Procurement Advisory Council, which *shall* be the judge of equivalency. The equivalent training may count toward the continuing education requirements of this Section, as determined by the College, in consultation with the Guam Procurement Advisory Council.

Excerpts from Applicable Laws

(f) Basic Training Requirements. The College *shall* provide at least four (4) modules of procurement basic training, each with *at least* eighteen (18) hours of study and instruction, or more, as the College may determine as necessary, and *shall* award a Certificate of Enrichment of training to those qualifying, as required by this Section, for each module of the following subject matter areas:

Module 1. Fundamentals and Principles of Procurement (Basic).

Module 2. The Procurement Solicitation Process (Advanced).

Module 3. The Procurement Review and Remedies (Administrative).

Module 4. The Management and Administration of Procurement (Administrative).

[...]

(n) Procurement Training Compliance Report.

- (1) Timeline for Submission. No later than thirty (30) days after the end of each fiscal year, every director, administrator, president or head of a government of Guam agency, including line agencies, autonomous and semi-autonomous agencies, public corporations, the Mayors Council of Guam, the Courts of the Judiciary of Guam, and *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* shall electronically submit to the Public Auditor of Guam, in an electronic portable document format, a "Procurement Training Compliance Report."
- (2) Content Guidelines. Said report shall at minimum list the employees by name, job title, each procurement training module completed, and the date of completion.
